### The Body Doesn't Lie Part One: How to Correctly Write and Read Body Language

For the purpose of clarity: I use the names Jack and Jill, (men statistically lie more than women).

# Jack might lie but his body can't!

• Jack might tell two types of lies:

<u>Omission</u>: Jack won't tell the whole truth. He'll leave out parts. <u>Commission</u>: Jack will make stuff up.

- There's a Continuum of Dishonesty ... 1 lowest level- 7 Highest
- The higher the level, the more body cues you might include in your narrative.

Level 1: Lazy Liar Jack's Lies: Shorten the story Won't be protested by anyone Helps him dodge the subject Prevents an argument

<u>Level 2</u> The Embellisher Jack uses lies to: impress compete sell

Level 3 The Avoider Jack tells: Nice lies, "Yes, I love your new haircut" Avoids offending others Avoids having to explain Avoids uncomfortable situations "I have a migraine," Not, I really don't want to go." <u>Level 4</u> Jack is a Defensive Liar Lies to protect the truth Lies to protect a secret To cover for self or someone else

#### Level 5

Jack is an: Intentional Liar Lie to get a reaction: Jealousy "I hiked the whole Appalachian Trail," Wants a reaction, "You can't retire? I could retire now" When caught, often admits they lied but justify with "I was just messing with you." By possessing awareness, they show some ability to change

#### Level 6

Jack is a: Pathological Liar Will lie consistently "Even when the truth would do better" Not necessarily a Sociopathic liar (lie may not profit from his lies Unconscious, spontaneous lying Often unaware they are lying, believe their own truth

#### Level 7

Jack is a Psychopath <u>The Big One: The villainous sociopathic or psychopathic liar</u> Any means to achieve an end that works for them Will be clustered with other criteria for this diagnosis:

Criteria for Antisocial Personality Disorder Included FYI

- Superficially charming; "silver tongued"
- •Self-absorbed and egocentric
- Easily bored, in need of constant stimulation
- •Habitual liar
- Manipulative
- •Shows no remorse; rationalizes wrongdoings, says people deserve it
- Shallow emotions
- Lacks empathy
- •Exploits the goodwill of others especially financially
- •Sexually promiscuous
- Impulsive
- •Behaves recklessly
- •Accepts no responsibility for actions
- •Had behavior problems as a child

•Lacks inhibitions

- •Has no long-term goals
- •Have many short term relationships

•No respect for authority, including the law

•Thinks they are never wrong

• May be highly intelligent, but has no conscience

• Keep in mind as you write!!

Psychopaths are socialized, the smarter they are (and <u>most</u> are very smart), the more they know and try to adhere to social norms. They know what folks are looking for.

• Does Jack have a Personality Disorder where lying is inherent? <u>Narcissists</u>: These people tend to lie to boost their self-image and increase their power over others.

Borderline: This is a compulsive personality disorder.

Histrionic Lying because of an excessive attention-seeking disorder.

Antisocial personality disorder: Psychopath, Sociopath Lie to manipulate

- Why an "ordinary "Jack might lie:
- To Avoid Punishment
- To protect someone else from punishment
- Being Polite (Socialized)
- Avoid Embarrassment
- To appear "normal"
- To protect or maintain privacy
- To gain a reward
  - WE NEED TO KNOW!!! They may look and act "ordinary," but have criminal intent.

Which is why we want to be certain.

• Why Jill might block the lies

You may write Jill's unconscious motivation

She can stay in denial about Jack being a "bad guy"

Jill may be forced to act if his lies are acknowledged and not accepted

Jill might justify his lies with: "Well how can I judge? I lie too."

He does not answer questions, or gives evasive answers; he speaks nonsense, rubs the great toe along the ground; and shivers; his face is discolored; he rubs the roots of his hair with his fingers. Description of a liar, 900 BC

• What doesn't work:

Do not put a lie detector test as evidence in your manuscript

Polygraph tests have questionable reliability. They can be used to intimidate a suspect and interrogate but are **generally not admissible as evidence in court**.

• Artificial Intelligence lie detectors

Is AI lie detector accurate?

Highly controversial because **the notion of an accurate lie detector machine remains science fiction**, and with good reason: There's no evidence of a "universal psychological signal" for deceit.

• Proof that the body doesn't lie

#### Pedophiles Phallometric testing. PPG is an FDA approved device and is admissible in courts as evidence.

Most accurate: Observation and interpretation
